This past fiscal year was a trying year for all, but it brought hope. As we kept our youth, children and many families safe through a pandemic and snowstorm, we saw the best emerge from our community. There were those who supported through financial contributions, provided meals, made/donated masks, fostered and wrapped their arms around our children. We couldn't have gotten through this past year without YOU.

We truly feel blessed and are extremely proud of how we were able to close out Fiscal Year 2021. We witnessed amazing accomplishments and significant growth; we were awarded the Region 8b contract with the Department of Family and Protective Services, and announced our new division Belong; celebrated our second graduating class from our on-campus charter school, run by the UT Charter School System; the growth of our Parenting & Prevention Program, allowing us to help families in their own homes; continued to serve the hundreds of youth daily at our campuses; and helped the Child Placement Agency grow into our largest program, thus helping more children find everlasting families.

We are so thankful for those who made FY21 one to remember including our incredible staff, foster families, volunteers and donors. Because of YOU, we are able to continue successfully fulfilling our mission of offering healing and hope to children and families affected by abuse, abandonment or neglect. On behalf of SJRC Texas, I am grateful for your dedication, generosity and support through it all. Your efforts have allowed us to bring children to forever families, cheer on several youth who graduated High School and witness young mom's bond with their babies for the first time. While we receive 60% of our funds from the state of Texas, we must fundraise to fulfill the remaining 40%, which is approximately two million dollars annually. We are thrilled to announce that we exceeded our fundraising goal in FY21, which in turn allowed us to meet every child's needs and provide them a safe home where they could heal and thrive!

As we step into our next fiscal year, I am beyond proud of what SJRC Texas has accomplished and excited about the future. This year alone, our organization worked with over 1,000 volunteers, cared for more than 200 children/young adults, employed 76 dedicated staff and completed 1/3 of our Charter School Capital Campaign. Our community has gone above and beyond this year and there is no way we would be able to continue to help these children by keeping them safe and healthy without your support. May God bless all of you and keep you safe during this time.







SISTERS

We have two teen sisters that were placed in one of our foster homes just over two years ago. The foster mom already knew the girls from the emergency shelter she works at, which led her and her husband to foster the sisters. Their main priority was getting the girls caught up in school since they were both about two years behind. The sisters were equally committed and quickly signed up for night classes to get them caught up to grade level while attending their regular high school all day. They spent about a year going to night school, working tirelessly to complete the additional work. As of now, not only are they both caught up, but both sisters were able to graduate from high school together and are attending the University of Texas at San Antonio!





STEPHANIE'S STORY

Stephanie's life before SJRC was one of constant chaos, sexual exploitation and fear. Stephanie is a mother of a 2-year-old boy, Paul, who she loves dearly. Stephanie was first trafficked by a family friend at the age of 15 years old. Her life quickly spiraled from there as she lost ties with her family, friends and ultimately her son who was removed from her care. At 17-years-old, Stephanie was homeless, traumatized and without the one thing that she still cared about in this world, her son.

SJRC Texas received the referral for Stephanie and after learning that she had a son advocated for the opportunity for them to be placed together. After five months of separation, they were finally reunited! Stephanie came to SJRC Texas with not much more than her child and what she could carry. She was terrified, exhausted and unsure of her future. Stephanie knew that this was her chance to regain custody of her son and ensure that he was never removed again. Not long after being placed with us we learned that Paul required surgery on his spine, which resulted in a three week hospital stay. SJRC Texas staff and case managers were there every step of the way to ensure that her son was cared for and that Stephanie was supported throughout process. This situation would be terrifying for an average parent much less a teen mother in foster care with a small support system of CPS workers and SJRC Staff.

Since her placement date, Stephanie has been able to receive intensive therapy for the complex trauma she survived. She is learning appropriate boundaries and opening up about the abuse she suffered at the hands of her family and trafficker. She is learning how to nurture and show her son the love that she was not given. While Stephanie still has a long road ahead of her, she is focused on her family's future and is excited about where it will take her. With the support from SJRC Texas, she was able to graduate high school and obtain her driver's license. She is now working in the community and saving money for when she is ready to live on her own. Stephanie states that she cannot believe she was able to turn her life around and it scares her to think what would have happened if she had not found her way to SJRC Texas!
